

• I left St Thomas More's Catholic High School in 1981. I was set 3 for most lessons, and was the invisible child, always did their homework, never late, never caused a problem. I cruised, did what I had to do to survive. My options were all practical subjects (no homework required) I was entered for CSEs and gained all eight as well as two O'levels paid for by my parents.

Within a week of leaving school, I was in the workplace and my typing skills being put to good use. Being the youngest of 5 sisters I found conversing easy with my elders and I made good progress in the business world. By 1986 I was working as a Local Government Officer and soon had a supervisory position.

Then came the family and I decided I wanted to spend as much time as possible with my young family, so set up a business from home, and had the benefits of both worlds.

I returned to the workforce in 2000 as a school clerk of a large primary school with 300 children on roll. This was about the time that the Government was offloading more and more duties from the local authority to the schools and the post of School Business Manager was being created. Training was heavily subsided and I enrolled on a Certification of School Business Management. The educational experience was exhilarating, I excelled and emersed myself completely in the learning process, all the time juggling work and being mum.

Roles in school changed. I became the lead for HR, Finance, Premises, Health & Safety and Environmental issues. I created a networking group with other local primary schools, sharing good practice and offering support to the less confident. Every time I thought about moving on for my career progression, the Headteacher beat me to it, so I ended up staying for 15 years.

2 years after the CSBM, I enrolled on the Diploma for School Business Management, again excelling at the work based education and forging networking links further afield from my Penwortham cluster.

2014 saw a big change, after a few attempts, I finally managed to secure a position within a high school. This high school had undergone a devastating fire in 2013 and lost two thirds of the school buildings. Staff were unhappy with leadership and industrial action had taken place. There were lots of staff absences and the quality of education was less than satisfactory.

A school in 'Requires Improvement, falling roll, overstaffing and long term absences soon put the finances in a deficit position and I was tasked to come up with a recovery plan to pay off the £500,000 debt within a three year period.

Fast forward to 2020, debt cleared, school considered 'Good' by Ofsted, teaching good, happy staff, thriving students. Not bad for an 'average' child.

I am a Personal Development, Health and Physical Education Teacher in Sydney, Australia. I attended St. Claire's Catholic Primary School before moving onto Corpus Christi Catholic High School between 2007 to 2012.

At high school, I was definitely not the brightest pupil in the class and had a number of challenges to overcome throughout my high school years. I was a St Gregory's pupil who enjoyed a happy and successful high school at Corpus Christi and signed for Preston North End football Club as an apprentice on the day I left school in 1993.

I broke into the first team in 1996, making 55 appearances and scoring three goals. From PNE I moved to West Brom, Sunderland, Everton, Wigan, Hull City and Huddersfield Town to eventually end my career at Derby County making a total of 600 appearances and scoring 53 goals.

I was awarded my first Ireland cap against Iceland in September 1997. I was thrilled to represent Ireland and proud to stand second only to Shay Given as the most capped Irish player of all time. As a versatile left-sided player I mainly performed in defence after spending much of my career as a winger. I also played in the World Cup play-off ties against France in November 2009 and also played against Brazil in London.

I scored a total of eight international goals, always remembering with pride my spectacular headed goal in the UEFA 2012 qualifying tie against Andorra at the Aviva Stadium in September 2010. Unluckily sustaining a back injury brought an end to my remarkable feats in international football.

Towards the end of my career I have concentrated on forging a media career and now work as an analyst for Virgin Media Television (Ireland), BBC Radio 5 Live, BBC *Match of the Day, Football Focus*, Final Score and Ireland's *Newstalk* Radio Off the Ball Football Show.
